If you think you should be tested for COVID-19 [from the [City of Philadelphia's COVID-19 testing FAQ](#)]:

- **Start with your regular medical provider or the hospital system where you last received medical care. Call or contact them over the internet so that a medical professional can evaluate whether testing is appropriate for you.**

If you cannot get tested through your medical provider, you can be tested at a public drive-through site:

- Citizens Bank Park
 - Hours: Daily from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m.
 - To be tested here, you must have symptoms of a fever and new onset of cough AND be either over 50 or a health care worker.
- Rite Aid, 7401 Ogontz Ave., 19138
 - Hours: Daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
 - To be tested here, you must be a healthcare worker or a first responder. You do not need to have symptoms.
- Center City (undisclosed location) – please call (267) 491-5870 for information.
- No appointment is needed but expect to wait.
- Bring your driver's license or PHL City ID and insurance card (if you have one). Persons will NOT be turned away due to lack of insurance or documentation, and the test will be done at no cost.
- Note that these sites ONLY perform testing. If you have a worsening cough, shortness of breath, or fever over 101 for more than three days, please seek medical attention from your primary care provider, an urgent care clinic, or a hospital emergency department (call in advance to tell them you have symptoms so they can prepare and wear a mask if possible).
- When traveling to a testing site, wear a surgical mask over your nose and mouth. If you do not have a surgical mask, wear a scarf over your nose and mouth.

Montgomery County Public Testing

- Public testing is available by appointment only from 10am – 6pm daily at Temple University's Ambler Campus in Upper Dublin Township. Please see below for eligibility criteria and details on how to schedule an appointment.

The Governor’s ‘Stay at Home’ order does not prohibit food banks and their volunteers from offering food services, nor do they prohibit school districts from offering food services to children during the statewide school closure. Food will continue to be available at schools, food pantries and additional sites. Schools and school districts may continue to bring in essential employees involved in the preparation and distribution of meals.

The following resources have been consolidated from [Governor Wolf’s COVID-19 resources portal](#), [the PA Department of Agriculture](#), [the City of Philadelphia](#), and Montgomery County school districts.

For Individuals Seeking Food:

- Food resources are available at **schools, food pantries, and additional pick-up sites.**

Food Banks & Pantries – Eligibility Criteria & General Information

- If you are out of work without pay, you are eligible to receive food from a food bank or pantry.
- This includes service workers who are unable to get shifts or hourly wage employees of non-essential businesses that have voluntarily closed due to COVID-19 mitigation.
- **To find a food bank or pantry**

- **Eligibility Criteria**
 - You will be asked to verbally complete a [Self-Declaration of Need](#) form, signatures have been temporarily waived due to COVID-19. (Forms are available in [Spanish](#) & [Russian](#)).
 - You will be asked to provide your household size and weekly income level as of the day you apply. [Complete income guidelines](#) can be found at [agriculture.pa.gov](#).
- **Frequently Asked Questions**
 - **How do I get food from a food bank if I can't leave my house because I am under isolation or quarantine?**
 - If you or a family member is under isolation or quarantine, contact your local food bank to see if they have options to deliver food. If you are concerned about potential exposure, there are steps you and food banks can take to limit risk.
 - **What do I do if my local food pantry is closed?**
 - You can go to another food pantry in your area, using the links above. We recommend checking with your local food bank to ensure other local food pantries are open.
 - **How will students access meals while schools are closed?**
 - The Pennsylvania Department of Education offers information on accessing meals on its [website](#).

SNAP Benefits

- DHS is continuing to process applications and benefit renewals for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Emergency SNAP applications can be expedited and issued in five days. Pennsylvanians can apply for SNAP online at [www.compass.state.pa.us](#).

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- DHS will continue to process application and renewal benefits, so people should continue to send in paperwork as usual. But, for anyone currently on SNAP who misses a deadline, who is not able to submit the paperwork or complete an interview or provide verifications for any reason during this emergency, DHS will ensure their SNAP benefit continues. DHS submitted a waiver request to the federal Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) to ensure this continuity in benefits.

To volunteer at a food pantry or food bank

- The Wolf Administration also asks that anyone who is healthy and able please consider volunteering with a local food bank or [registering for the State Emergency Registry of Volunteers in Pennsylvania](#), as this time is creating an incredible strain on charitable organizations' efforts.
- [United Way of Pennsylvania's 211 website](#) is also compiling organizations that need volunteers or resources so their work can continue.
